Ed & Kim Fischer live in Litchfield CT and had heard about this show and been invited by many of their friends to attend. They had wanted to bring their 1969 Beaumont in 2022 for the Maple Leaf Display and decided to do a snow scene around the car. Unfortunately remodeling their daughter's home did not allow them to prep the car for the show. Kim saw a Beaumont for the first time at a CanAm Chevelle Club show many years ago. Kim did her research and found out a Beaumont is cross between a Chevelle and GTO to allow fair trade in Canada between the Pontiac and Chevrolet dealers. They both decided that they wanted to own one themselves. Ed found this Beaumont online in 2015. They travelled with truck and trailer to the French-Canadian section of Ontario to purchase the Beaumont, stopping along the way in Michigan to visit their daughter Tina while she was attending Kettering University. Ed collected parts for two years before he began a complete frame off restoration to mostly stock appearing.
